
2. What is your present position?






7. What is the approximate enrollment of the school?





25. How did your professional preparation program effectively prepare you to teach? What were the strengths of your professional preparation program?

26. In what areas do you wish your professional preparation program had prepared you more effectively?

Allowing us to see and use teacher instructional books and planning lessons from that would have helped with seeing what is actually like to plan.

The program should be developed to align itself with current practices. Many of the classes I took during the Educational Leadership program were not reflective of shifts in education.

While the courses were helpful it should be taught that not all schools will be supportive, parent teacher interaction, teacher administration interaction, and this is difficult for first year teachers. In addition to this it should be stressed at what to do when adversity is in place. These are lessons that I wish were taught. Text book classrooms and text book schools are just that. Teaching in an actual school may not go as smoothly as when we create lessons and practice in class or even in our internships.

27. Describe the relevance of your professional preparation program in relationship to the realities of your teaching placement.
